Carotid duplex - Doppler ultrasound scan

What is the purpose of this information leaflet?

This leaflet will provide information regarding a test you have been referred for.


What is this test measuring and what is it for?

The carotid and vertebral arteries are the blood vessels that carry oxygen rich blood to the head, brain, eyes, and face. They are located on each side of the neck. These blood vessels can become narrowed, or more rarely, blocked, affecting the blood flow to the brain. When narrowed, tiny pieces of plaque or clot can break away from the narrowed artery and be carried in the blood stream to the brain. This can cause symptoms including changes to eyesight, weakness in a limb, or speech disturbance. The effects may be temporary (TIA) or longer lasting (stroke). We may be doing this scan because you have had symptoms like these. Some other reasons include pulsatile tinnitus, or if you are being screened before cardiac surgery.

We use a specialised form of ultrasound scanner (known by many people as the type of machine used for scanning babies in the womb). This gives us images of the blood vessels in your neck and information on the blood flow through them. Using the images and measurement of blood speed and volume, we are able to accurately determine if there is any narrowing of the blood vessels and, if so, how severe this is.

Preparing for your test

No preparation is needed, but it may be best if you wear clothing that allows easy access to your neck and avoid necklaces.



Who performs the test?

A qualified vascular scientist will perform the scan, usually with an assistant in the room. Sometimes a trainee vascular scientist may perform your scan, but will be supervised during the scan and in writing the report.

What to expect during the test


You will lie flat on a couch with your head on a pillow. The lights will be dimmed. Warmed water based gel is placed on your neck and a small ultrasound probe is placed on your skin. It is slowly moved while the vascular scientist looks at images on the screen of the machine. You will also hear blood flow sounds from the machine in line with your pulse.

Does it hurt?

It should not hurt at all. Only light pressure is applied to the skin.

How long does it take?

Usually about 20 minutes.



Will the results be explained to me?

Further analysis is usually necessary with review of the images and measurements, so we may only be able to give you a summary of the scan findings at the time of the scan.

How soon will my referring doctor receive my results?

Reports are usually written immediately after the test has been completed and are available on the hospital's information system within a few minutes. A printed copy of the report is sent to the referring doctor the next working day.
