Your immigration status post-Brexit

Who needs to apply?

- All EU nationals except Irish citizens
- Swiss citizens
- Citizens from Norway, Iceland & Lichtenstein (part of the European Economic Area)
 - Including children and family members

What will you get?

• If your application is successful – the right to continue living and working in the UK after 31 December 2020

You will be given either:

- **Settled Status** if you have lived in the UK for a continuous 5-year period
- **Pre-Settled Status** if you do not have 5 years' continuous residence when you apply. You can then apply to change this to Settled Status once you've got 5 years' continuous residence

Your Rights

You will be able to:

- work in the UK
- use the NHS
- enrol in education or continue studying
- access public funds such as benefits and pensions, if you are eligible for them
- travel in and out of the UK

How to apply

- Use a computer, tablet or mobile phone
- Complete your online application form with 3 key steps:
 - Prove your identity (i.e. Passport or ID card)
 - Show that you live in the UK (i.e. National Insurance n.)
 - Declare any criminal conviction
- It is **FREE** to apply to the EU Settlement Scheme

- Eligibility: you need to be living in the UK by 31 December 2020
- Application Deadline: 30 June 2021
