Guests including The Mayor of Poole, artist Ellie Drake-Lee and Dr Stephen Kirkham, who was the first consultant at Forest Holme when it opened, joined hospice staff, supporters and charity trustees in the gardens at Merley House to officially open the display, which was then available to view to the public.

The event, which was sponsored by Gallagher Insurance in Poole, took place exactly 30 years to the day that Forest Holme Hospice Charity, or Friends of Forest Holme as it was known then, first opened its doors to raise funds for the then new specialist palliative care unit based at Seldown Road in Poole.

The Charity officially launched on 26 April 1994 and since then donations from supporters have helped the hospice to care for over 30,000 patients and their families.

Members of the public have the opportunity to own one of these commemorative handcrafted stained-glass flowers, skilfully created by the talented artist Ellie Drake-Lee from Garden Glass Art, which will be available for delivery or collection for the rest of the year.

Hannah O' Hare, CEO of Forest Holme Hospice Charity, said:

If This installation serves as a symbol of remembrance, hope, and the enduring spirit of compassion that defines Forest Holme's commitment to endof-life care. The art installation offers a focal point of reflection and inspiration during our

30th anniversary year and is an opportunity for supporters and community members to purchase and own a special commemorative handcrafted piece of art, serving as a poignant tribute to love, loss, and compassion.



Artist Ellie added:

I am thrilled to be involved in this colourful celebration of a fundraising initiative. It means so much to me on a personal level and an artistic level. Both my parents were cared for at the end of their lives at a hospice, so I know how vital it is to support them in raising funds. Patients' pre-op checks now paperless have their operation as soon as possible," said Hannah.

atients who require surgery under local or general anaesthetic have always needed to complete a health questionnaire prior to the procedure, to help spot any complications that might arise beforehand. And historically, these always meant a trip to hospital to meet with a member of the preoperative assessment

But now patients can complete these important checks securely online at a time that's convenient to them, meaning there's no need to attend hospital for this service. These checks can highlight any relevant medical history a patient may have, any conditions that may need to be addressed before surgery, the most appropriate type of anaesthetic and even the way the surgery is performed.

The benefits are expected to be significant, said Dr Hannah McPhee, consultant anaesthetist and University Hospitals Dorset's clinical lead for preoperative assessment and the MyPreOp digital service.

Pre-op assessments are completed for every patient who is going to have a procedure under anaesthesia at UHD. They are a vital part of ensuring our patients are as safe as possible before, during and after their surgery, * Hannah explains.

They identify reasons why a patient may need particular care at the time of their operation, for example because of their medical history, whether they are likely to experience complications from anaesthesia and surgery and allow us to put

individualised plans in place to make surgery as safe as possible."

The service is suitable for most patients, but there are some who may not like the idea of completing the questionnaire electronically, are unable to, or for whom it's important to meet an expert clinician before surgery. For these patients, face-to-face appointments are still available, and everyone has access to skilled preoperative assessment nurses by phone should they need it. **4** Some patients do need extra support, so focusing our expertise on those patients should ensure that all patients can be ready to

Gecause patients can complete the assessment as soon as the decision is made for a procedure, rather than waiting for a hospital appointment, we are able to identify more complex patients as early as possible, allowing us time to do necessary tests and planning, without delaying surgery, and speeding up the process for those who are more straightforward, too."

assessment at home cannot be overstated - for many patients, an operation may already mean taking time off work afterwards, for example. Taking away the need for an extra hospital visit in the run up to the procedure will be welcomed by many.



Virtual reality

virtual tour of the **Poole Hospital** neonatal unit has gone live, enabling families to 'visit' the ward and get a better understanding of what to expect if their child needs neonatal care.

The 3D tour is available on our hospital trust's website and can either be watched in one go or navigated at the user's own pace. Information tags have been added to explain the different areas of the neonatal unit and the equipment to help people familiarise themselves with the clinical area.

Lucy Fairbrass, deputy sister for the unit, said:

Within the tour they will see the layout of the unit and can hear typical sounds of the clinical environment. There are informational tags that identify medical equipment used, areas parents would access frequently and facilities available for families if they have a baby on the neonatal unit.

We hope the tour will help potential families prepare and know a little more about what to expect if their baby needs specialist care from our team at Poole. Our hope is that this will help families to visualise where their baby will be cared for, reduce uncertainty and therefore increase the family's wellbeing."

Back our BEACH!



Our UHD charity has launched their biggest ever fundraising campaign, calling on our local community to help provide additional items for the new six-storey building at the Royal Bournemouth Hospital and in doing so, helping to transform healthcare across Dorset.

The new building is the size of 115 tennis courts and known as the 'BEACH', for Birth, Emergency, Critical Care and Children's Health. This building will provide new purpose-built maternity and children's units, an improved major emergency department and will be one of the biggest critical care units in the country.



Chief executive officer for University Hospitals Dorset, Siobhan Harrington said: "There couldn't be a bigger milestone in the history of our hospitals where we see such investment on this scale."

already been invested to reconfigure healthcare across Dorset, and now, our hospital's charity will be raising funds to provide a variety of invaluable items that will ensure the new BEACH Building has everything it needs to take our healthcare into the future - above and beyond what the NHS will fund."

GBy supporting The BEACH Appeal, everybody can help make long-lasting differences to the experience of every patient, staff member and hospital visitor who comes through those doors. Together we can ensure our BEACH Building is one of a kind and meets the needs of everybody that depends on our services in the ways we have imagined.

One of the many fundraising items includes an additional state-of-the-art CT scanner which will be situated in the centre of the new emergency department. Whether patients are arriving from

minor injuries, paediatric ED, or the observation ward, every patient will be within approximately 20 metres of the scanner. This will enable double the number of patients to be scanned, diagnosed and treated within critical timeframes.



Funds will also go towards new wellbeing gardens adjacent to the new critical care unit to provide a tranquil outdoor space for patients, visitors and staff to experience fresh air, natural light, and nature during their time on the unit. New indoor and outdoor play areas in the new children's health department to give children joy and a break away from clinical areas, will also be funded.

As well as additional equipment, funds will also provide artistically designed elements in the BEACH Building to enhance the patient experience and working environments for staff, a bereavement suite for the maternity unit, and mental health rooms for our ED.

If the fundraising target is not achieved, these meaningful items cannot be provided which is why our hospital's charity is calling everybody in the local community to come together, to back The BEACH Appeal and help make this vision a reality.

Dr Isabel Smith, medical director for strategy and transformation, said:

If The separation of planned and emergency care within our new and existing buildings will enable us to transform our services as there will be shorter wait times and fewer cancellations for planned procedures at Poole Hospital by avoiding the referrals between our hospital sites.

However, to provide a better experience under our care in each of the new departments, we also need the additional equipment and facilities mentioned

within those departments to meet the needs of our patients during their time with us - not just now, but for generations to come. The additional CT scanner and children's play areas are great examples of this."



Staff will also benefit as we can offer facilities to further support their wellbeing while fulfilling demanding roles. We can also attract more medical professionals to join the UHD Team to work out of our exemplary facilities.

'New era' for patient care as Dorset Pathology Hub officially opens

A 'new era' in medical diagnostics and patient care in Dorset was celebrated as NHS staff and partners gathered recently to witness patient Steve Hiorns officially open the state-of-the-art Dorset Pathology Hub.

The new £24m facility is equipped with the latest specialist technology, ensuring high-quality, cost-effective diagnostics and care for patients across the region.

The Hub is already making a significant impact, particularly through the benefits of personalised medicine and the implementation of AI and deep learning in cancer diagnostics.

Dr. Katie Adie CBE DL, broadcaster and Chancellor of Bournemouth University, unveiled a commemorative plaque to mark the occasion.

Steve Hiorns, the patient whose blood was the first to be analysed at the hub, cut a ribbon to officially open the facility.

Mark Mould, UHD's chief operating officer and the project's senior responsible officer, expressed his gratitude during the celebration event:

"This is a special day as we celebrate a new era for our local NHS and the patients we serve.

"Delivering a project of this scale is a true

team effort, and we are grateful for the support of our partners, many of whom were able to join us at the event.

If This project has not just been about buildings but building futures - the Hub improves diagnostics for patients, helping to meet the growing demand for specialist treatment, as well as providing development opportunities for staff."

The new facility is located on the Wessex Fields site next to the Royal Bournemouth Hospital and is part of the One Dorset Pathology network - a collaborative partnership between Dorset County Hospital and University Hospitals Dorset.

The project has been backed by the Dorset Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP), which supported the project with a £2.7m Local



Growth Fund investment in the histopathology diagnostic hub as part of its initiatives to support Covid-19 recovery and accelerate healthcare resilience in the county.

Cecila Bufton, chair of the Dorset LEP Board said:

It is a proud moment for Dorset LEP to witness the impact our £2.7m investment into the histopathology diagnostic service is having on the health and communities right across Dorset.

"The state-of-the-art laboratory at RBH supports hospitals across the region, offering a fast, accurate, routine and specialist testing service.

"Having started my career in laboratory diagnostics, I am fully aware how such a service can make a significant difference to health

outcomes for people in Dorset."

The Hub opened in November 2023, with the molecular pathology the first team to move in. It currently works to process over nine million tests per year, diagnose conditions in around 80% of all patients seen by the NHS and employs 200 staff - offering 24/7 365 days a year support.







Tech supports diabetes care

Approximately 4.7 million people in the UK live with diabetes. These people are at higher risk of foot care problems, if not treated properly this can lead to ulceration. Some of these may progress to amputation. Diabetes-related ulceration and amputation cost the NHS up to £1bn a year.

The NERVE project is a collaboration between UHD and BU that was awarded a large NIHR i4i Innovation grant.

The project team developed the NERVE app (NEuRopathy evaluation using the Vibration function of a mobile phonE) and a probe to allow for regular testing either within a clinical setting or at home by either the patients or their carers.

The next stage of the project was to conduct the clinical trial to find out if the app and probe is as accurate and reliable as the current standard of care test for detecting loss of sensation in the feet.

Within the trial participants attended a single visit where a healthcare professional tested the NERVE device and the current standard of care device. Participants were also provided with the chance to test the NERVE device for themselves.

The recruitment target was 300 participants with diabetes, and the research team recruited 314 participants with diabetes across Royal Bournemouth and Poole hospitals.

Charlotte Humphrey is one of the research nurses who worked on the study. She said:

"NERVE was a great way to get out on the wards and meet patients. I really enjoyed being able to offer them the opportunity to be part of research in an easy and accessible way."

Next steps...

The project team is now preparing the data for statistical analysis of the results to be published. Results will also inform further development of the NERVE device.

Pasco's project; a united front to fight infections

From Africa to Dorset, see how Team UHD is working with international colleagues to tackle antimicrobial resistance...

In November 2023, Dr Pasco Hearn, consultant microbiologist and head of microbiology at UHD, obtained £65,000 for a project called The Commonwealth Partnerships for Antimicrobial Stewardship (CwPAMS2) - from a fund aimed at healthcare partnerships. Funding came from **Tropical Health Education** Trust (THET) and the Commonwealth Pharmacists' Association (CPA).

Pasco's project, lasting 21 months, covers three key topics; microbiology. antimicrobial stewardship. and infection prevention control activities.

In May 2024, the team that was assembled by Pasco travelled to Dorset, and spent two weeks working alongside him and UHD's microbiology, pharmacy and infection prevention and control teams

to gain a better understanding of how NHS processes compare to those in the Ugandan healthcare system.

Here are their reflections...

Pasco: #I went out to Lira with Poole Africa Link, and after making some great connections I applied for funding for this project. The lead in Uganda is Dr Francis Kiweewa and he and I formed a team to address the issue of antimicrobial resistance.

The approach starts in the laboratory to bolster microbiology services, so that we can make sure we find resistant organisms when they're there. The next step is AMS, linking up pharmacy, the lab and the clinical teams, with the third prong being IPC.

It's great to welcome Maria, a microbiology scientist who runs the micro lab in Lira: Dr Frednald, a doctor who chairs the IPC committee: and Harriet, a senior pharmacist in Lira. They are all spending time here shadowing their counterparts in the NHS to see how a completely different healthcare system manages the same problems. "



Harriet Tino: 4The hospital's active involvement and role in patient care and management is great and something that has really stood out for me throughout my time here... "

Dr Frednald: "In our system we don't have someone assigned to IPC work the way vou do. But I have seen that the connections between IPC and the other streams in the hospital is key for patient safety and care..."

Maria Apaki: Since being here I'm learning a lot about what I can do in terms of treating patients. Patient safety is very key and there is proper screening of the prescription at every level. There are so many steps I've seen in the dispensing pharmacy that I want to implement slowly when I go back..."

Pasco: "I'm really happy that it all came together. Everyone has been very welcoming and these guys are putting in the time and effort in coming far away from home to a far and distant place. They have a different perspective with what they have seen from staff here at UHD; seeing how elements of our system will never really fit in their healthcare setting at the moment, but some of it definitely will be transferable. I think this partnership will go from strength to strength, and it's been of huge benefit to myself and our team...
